
Dave Salmon's impact as MSC Town Hall's advisor has been inimitable, as any current or former Town Hall member could tell you. While it is easy to point to recent Town Hall programming highlights like Kevin Hart, Twenty One Pilots, and Ben Rector, Town Hall has had a long list of impressive headliners under Dave's run as advisor. In fact, back in October of 1989, A&M brought rock legends R.E.M. to G Rollie White, the former home of the A&M basketball and volleyball teams.

R.E.M. formed in 1980, but despite being in the middle of their ascension to worldwide fame in 1989, they gave A&M students a full-force performance. The band played a 30 (Thirty!!!) song set, including 3 multi-song encores. Though criticisms of today's music scene as being "soulless" and "unoriginal" lack universal merit, it is rare to find a concert this thorough and crowdpleasing with today's more concise concert formats. R.E.M played hit songs, including "Orange Crush", "The One I Love", and "It's the End of the World as We Know It (And I Feel Fine)", and the 30 (again, THIRTY) songs spanned seven of the band's albums from throughout the

In addition to the music, singer Michael Stipe used his platform to open a discourse on politics, openly advocating for support of Greenpeace during the concert. Stipe made his remarks in a self-proclaimed attack on Exxon following their catastrophic Alaskan oil spill in

March of 1989. While politics are far from necessary in order to make an entertaining and engaging concert, it is still neat that A&M was able to host such a thrilling and topical concert in the heart of campus.

Though Town Hall will no doubt continue to bring in big names and socially relevant events (in no small part thanks to Dave's hard work over the years), it is still a huge blow to lose the man who has fearlessly guided Town Hall for decades. His impact can be seen in a captivating show like REM, but it can also be seen in the countless stories and memories of hundreds of Town Hallers. Dave has been more than an advisor; he's been a leader, a mentor, and a friend. We at Town Hall wish Dave the best in all he does, and we know that Town Hall will continue to bring in names that will make Dave proud.

1996-1999


